## *Overview Regarding Proposed Registration Regulation*

The College of Medical Radiation Technologists of Ontario (CMRTO) is proposing amendments to its registration regulation made under the *Medical Radiation Technology Act* principally to make the registration regulation compliant with the *Ontario Labour Mobility Act, 2009* (OLMA) and to implement the changes made to the *Regulated Health Professions Act, 1991* (RHPA) related to professional liability insurance when they come into force.

The proposed amendments to the current registration regulation include:

- Provisions to comply with OLMA (which form part of the RHPA) to support labour mobility for applicants who hold a specialty certificate of registration issued by a regulatory authority of another Canadian jurisdiction that is equivalent to a CMRTO specialty certificate of registration.
- The addition of a good conduct and character provision as a registration requirement in order to increase public protection.
- The addition of a requirement for all applicants to complete a program in jurisprudence relevant to the practice of the profession in Ontario. The College has a legislation learning package available online that is completed as self-directed learning.
- A provision to add, as a condition of a certificate of registration, that a member maintain professional liability insurance or protection against professional liability as set out in the College by-laws. This amendment is proposed in order to implement the changes made to the RHPA related to professional liability insurance when they come into force. The by-laws of the College will provide the specific requirements regarding professional liability insurance.
- Removing two classes of certificate of registration: Restricted – in vitro and employment specific – radiography. These two classes of certificate are now obsolete.
- Some general housekeeping items including: removing the periods in the abbreviations for the protected titles; removing the grandparenting provision for the specialty of magnetic resonance that has now expired; and updating the schedules of approved educational programs.

The attached chart sets out the current regulation, the proposed amendments and the rationale for the proposed amendments.

**PROPOSED REGULATION MADE UNDER  
THE *MEDICAL RADIATION TECHNOLOGY ACT, 1991***

Amending O. Reg. 866/93  
(Registration)

**1. Ontario Regulation 866/93 is amended by adding the following section:**

0.1 In this Regulation,

"Agreement on Internal Trade" means the Agreement on Internal Trade signed in 1994 by the governments of Canada, the provinces of Canada, the Northwest Territories and the Yukon Territory, as amended from time to time;

"out-of-province certificate" means a certificate, licence, registration, or other form of official recognition that,

- (a) attests to an individual being qualified to practise the profession and authorizes the individual to practise the profession, use a title or designation relating to the profession, or both, and
- (b) is granted to the individual by a body or individual that is authorized under an Act of Canada or of a province or territory of Canada that is a party to the Agreement on Internal Trade, other than Ontario, to grant such certificate, licence, registration, or other form of official recognition.

**2. Paragraphs 2 and 3 of subsection 1(1) of the Regulation are revoked.**

**3. Subsection 3(1) of the Regulation is amended by adding the following paragraph:**

- 3.1 The applicant's past and present conduct must afford reasonable grounds for the belief that the applicant
- i. is mentally capable to practise medical radiation technology;
  - ii. will practise medical radiation technology with decency, integrity and honesty and in accordance with the law; and
  - iii. has sufficient knowledge, skill and judgment to competently engage in the practice of medical radiation technology.

**4. Paragraph 5 of subsection 3(1) of the Regulation is amended by striking out "*Immigration Act (Canada)*" and substituting "*Immigration and Refugee Protection Act (Canada)*".**

**5. Subsection 3(1) of the Regulation is amended by adding the following paragraph:**

6. The applicant must have successfully completed the program in jurisprudence relevant to the practice of medical radiation technology in Ontario approved by the College.

**6. Subsection 3(2) of the Regulation is revoked and the following substituted:**

(2) The following are conditions of a certificate of registration of any class:

1. The member shall provide the College with details of any of the following that relate to the member and that occur or arise after the registration of the member:

i. A conviction for a criminal offence or an offence related to the regulation of the practice of the profession.

ii. A finding of professional misconduct, incompetency or incapacity, in Ontario in relation to another health profession or in another jurisdiction in relation to the profession or another health profession.

iii. A proceeding for professional misconduct, incompetency or incapacity, in Ontario in relation to another profession or in another jurisdiction in relation to the profession or another health profession.

2. The member shall maintain professional liability insurance or protection against professional liability in accordance with the by-laws of the College.

**7. Subsections (2) and (3) of section 4.1 of the Regulation are revoked.**

**8. The Regulation is amended by adding the following section:**

4.2(1) In this section,

"specialty" means the specialty of radiography, radiation therapy, nuclear medicine or magnetic resonance.

(2) Subsections (3) and (4) apply to an applicant who already holds an out-of-province certificate in one of the specialties that is equivalent to the specialty certificate of registration issued by the College in the specialty being applied for.

(3) The applicant shall be deemed to have met the requirements of paragraph 4 of subsection 3(1) where the requirement for the granting of the applicant's out-of-province certificate included language proficiency requirements equivalent to the requirements of that paragraph.

- (4) The applicant shall be deemed to have met the non-exemptible registration requirements set out in subsection 4(1) or subsection 4.1(1), as applicable, other than the requirement to pay fees, if all of the following requirements are met:
1. The applicant has provided a certificate, letter or other evidence satisfactory to the Registrar or the Registration Committee from every body or individual from whom the applicant currently holds an out-of-province certificate in one of the specialties confirming that the out-of-province certificate in that specialty is in good standing.
  2. The applicant satisfies the Registrar or the Registration Committee that,
    - i. the applicant has engaged in practice in the specialty in which the applicant currently holds an out-of-province certificate to the extent that would be permitted by the applicable specialty certificate of registration within the five years immediately preceding the date of the application, or
    - ii. the applicant has successfully completed a medical radiation technology program in the specialty in which the applicant currently holds an out-of-province certificate within the five years immediately preceding the date of the application.
  3. An applicant for a specialty certificate of registration – radiography must comply with all of the requirements of paragraphs 1 and 2 in radiography.
  4. An applicant for a specialty certificate of registration – radiation therapy must comply with all of the requirements of paragraphs 1 and 2 in radiation therapy.
  5. An applicant for a specialty certificate of registration – nuclear medicine must comply with all the requirements of paragraphs 1 and 2 in nuclear medicine.
  6. An applicant for a specialty certificate of registration – magnetic resonance must comply with all the requirements of paragraphs 1 and 2 in magnetic resonance.
- (5) Notwithstanding subsections (3) and (4), an applicant to whom subsection (2) applies must meet any registration requirement that,
1. is listed on the publicly accessible website referred to in clause 9(3)(a) of the *Ontario Labour Mobility Act, 2009*; and
  2. is stated on the website to be a permissible registration requirement for the specialty certificate of registration being applied for, adopted by the Government of Ontario under Article 708 of the Agreement on Internal Trade.

**9. Section 5 of the Regulation is revoked.**

**10. Section 6 of the Regulation is revoked.**

**11. Subsection 8(1) of the Regulation is amended by striking out "M.R.T." and substituting "MRT".**

**12. Subsection 8(2) of the Regulation is amended by striking out "M.R.T.(R.)", "M.R.T.(T.)", "M.R.T.(N.)" and "M.R.T.(M.R.)", and substituting "MRT(R)", "MRT(T)", "MRT(N)" and "MRT(MR)", respectively.**

**13. Schedule 1 of the Regulation is amended by adding the following items under the heading "Radiography":**

4.1 Eastern Ontario School of X-Ray Technology, Kingston, Ontario, in collaboration with Queen's University, Kingston, Ontario.

8.1 The Michener Institute For Applied Health Sciences, Toronto, Ontario, in collaboration with University of Toronto, Toronto, Ontario.
